

Hail to the Chief

Fort Macon State Park Superintendent, Jody Merritt, retired from state parks on September 1, 2009. For the Friends of Fort Macon, it has been a pleasure and inspiration to work under Jody's leadership. He will be sorely missed.

Jody was born on August 11, 1951 in Clinton, NC where he lived until he began college at North Carolina State University in 1969. Jody began working with state parks as a park attendant while he was still in college. After graduating with degrees in Natural Resource Management and Conservation, he became a park ranger at Raven Rock State Park. From there he went to Eno River State Park near Durham. After leaving Eno River, he went to Morrow Mountain State Park at Albemarle, where he remained for more than five years. In 1980 he went back to Eno River as the Park Superintendent before coming to Fort Macon in 1981.

Jody has two daughters, Carrie and Heather, who grew up at Fort Macon. Carrie is a graduate of UNC and now lives in New Bern with her husband, John. In July 2008 Carrie and John became the proud parents of a little boy, Grayden. Jody is enjoying time spent with his first grandchild. Jody's youngest daughter, Heather, is a graduate of UNC Wilmington. Heather lives in Wilmington where she teaches school.

Jody has served as Park Superintendent at Fort Macon State Park for the past 28 years. During his tenure at Fort Macon, Jody has become well known and respected among his peers for the high standards he instituted in operations and administration. This was no small task considering that Fort Macon State Park has been the most visited of all North Carolina State Parks for many years with an annual visitation of well over a million visitors.

In addition to setting high standards for day-do-day park operations, Jody has personally overseen the growth and expansion of park facilities. The largest projects include a major facilities expansion during 1988-90, the renovation of Fort Macon during 1998-2003, and now the Coastal Education Center which will open in 2009. The Fort Macon renovation was a \$12 million project, the largest of its kind undertaken by NC State Parks. The Coastal Education Center is the first LEED-certified "green" building to be constructed by NC State Parks and will cost more than \$8 million.

During the construction of the Coastal Education Center, Jody carefully reviewed every detail of the drawings and specifications, avoiding numerous problems prior to construction. He spent long hours of personal time late at night pouring over blueprints, memos and documents pertaining to these projects. By becoming personally involved in these projects he was instrumental in keeping contractors on track, eliminating problems and ensuring efficiency saving the State a significant amount of money.

In addition to his work for the NC State Parks, Jody has been active in community affairs. He has served on the board of the North Carolina Seafood Festival, and including time as board chairman. Of course, Jody is also an ex-officio member of the board of the Friends of Fort Macon.

Superintendent's Update









The opening of the building is tentatively scheduled to take place at the end of October.









Barry Smith Retires from Fort Macon State Park

Visitors to Fort Macon State Park over the past two decades have likely encountered the work of a special member of the park staff in many cases without realizing it. The behind-the-scenes work of this man has directly or indirectly kept the park running for years and provided visitors with a positive recreational and educational experience. That man is the park's chief of maintenance, Kenneth Barry Smith. For 23 years Barry has been the park's go-to man to make things happen. With a lifetime wealth of skills and experience to draw

upon, he could build or repair almost anything in the park. But all things must eventually come to an end. After his lengthy career with NC State Parks, the time had come for Barry to say goodbye. He retired on August 31.

Although he was born in Greensboro, N.C., Barry was on the move for much of his life. In 1965 he married and honeymooned in North Carolina. It was on his honeymoon that Barry and new wife Pat first visited— you guessed it—Fort Macon!

Early in his careet Barry trained at General Electric/ Honeywell and Bell Labs to be a field technician on the budding industrial computer systems that were beginning to appear. He also had an automobile painting shop where his specialty was painting hot rods. He later workedwith the New Jersey Water Company at Palmyra. He decided to move south again in 1983 to Morehead City, where he had family. He ran a cabinet shop until told by the minister of the First Baptist Church that Fort Macon State Park had a new job opening for a maintenance mechanic. Barry applied and got the job.

Prior to joining the Fort Macon staff, almost everything he did in some way prepared him for challenges he would face at the Park. As a child he loved to take things apart to see how they worked. He enjoyed

taking shop classes in high school, particularly woodworking and carpentry. At age sixteen he worked in a welding and pipe fitting shop. While attending college in Kansas he ran a picture frame shop. In industrial jobs, he frequently was able to adapt or modify machinery to make it run faster and more efficiently. From a love of automobiles, motorcycles, car shows and drag racing came the ability to repair, rebuild and restore almost any piece of machinery from automobiles to lawn mowers. From the many years with the water company came a knowledge of plumbing and repairing water systems.


Most of Barry's vast knowledge was self-taught. He was imbued with a natural curiosity to learn how things worked and the self-discipline to master the skills necessary to keep them working. Each new skill learned was seen as a challenge. Taking the sum of all these skills, he is someone who can say in all sincerity: "I can fix almost anything."

For more than two decades, Barry has used his many skills to keep Fort Macon State Park running. He was able to repair and maintain a fleet of park vehicles. He could take apart and rebuild the lawn mowers, weedeaters and maintenance equipment that kept the fort grounds, parking lots and roadsides trim and manicured. He made plumbing, electrical or carpentry repairs and modifications that kept park facilities up and running in service to park visitors. He was able to remodel and make additions to park buildings. He built cabinets, tables, chairs, donation boxes and bookcases for park facilities. He built a number of the park's exhibits,


restored rooms and displays. He was even called upon to build things for other parks. He could do almost any plumbing, welding, or construction the park needed. He designed the aluminum lifeguard stands used by the park lifeguards. He welcomed the challenge of unusual things such as repairing parts from a 140-year old Civil War musket; creating a replica gunpowder magazine door in the fort, complete with a functioning bronze lock; building a complete set of wood doors and panels for the fort restored rooms from scratch using copies of original drawings from the fort; or repairing the gun carriages of the fort's Civil War cannons.

The endless diversity of working at Fort Macon has provided numerous challenges for Barry for more than two decades. However, when long-time Park Superintendent Jody Merritt announced his retirement earlier this year, Barry felt it was time for him to do likewise and move on to enjoy a new phase of his life. Barry and Jody retired together on August 31st.

For the future, Barry intends to enjoy life at a slower pace. He enjoys the company of his friends, the thrill of riding his Harley-Davidson motorcycle, the handson work of repairing cars and motorcycles in his shop, the challenge of haggling at a swap-meet, and the satisfaction of restoring old firearms and knives. Although his co-workers at the park wish him well and miss him, they have many, many reminders all around them by which to remember him and his work.

The 2009 Summer Concert Series Great Success Despite the Weather


